

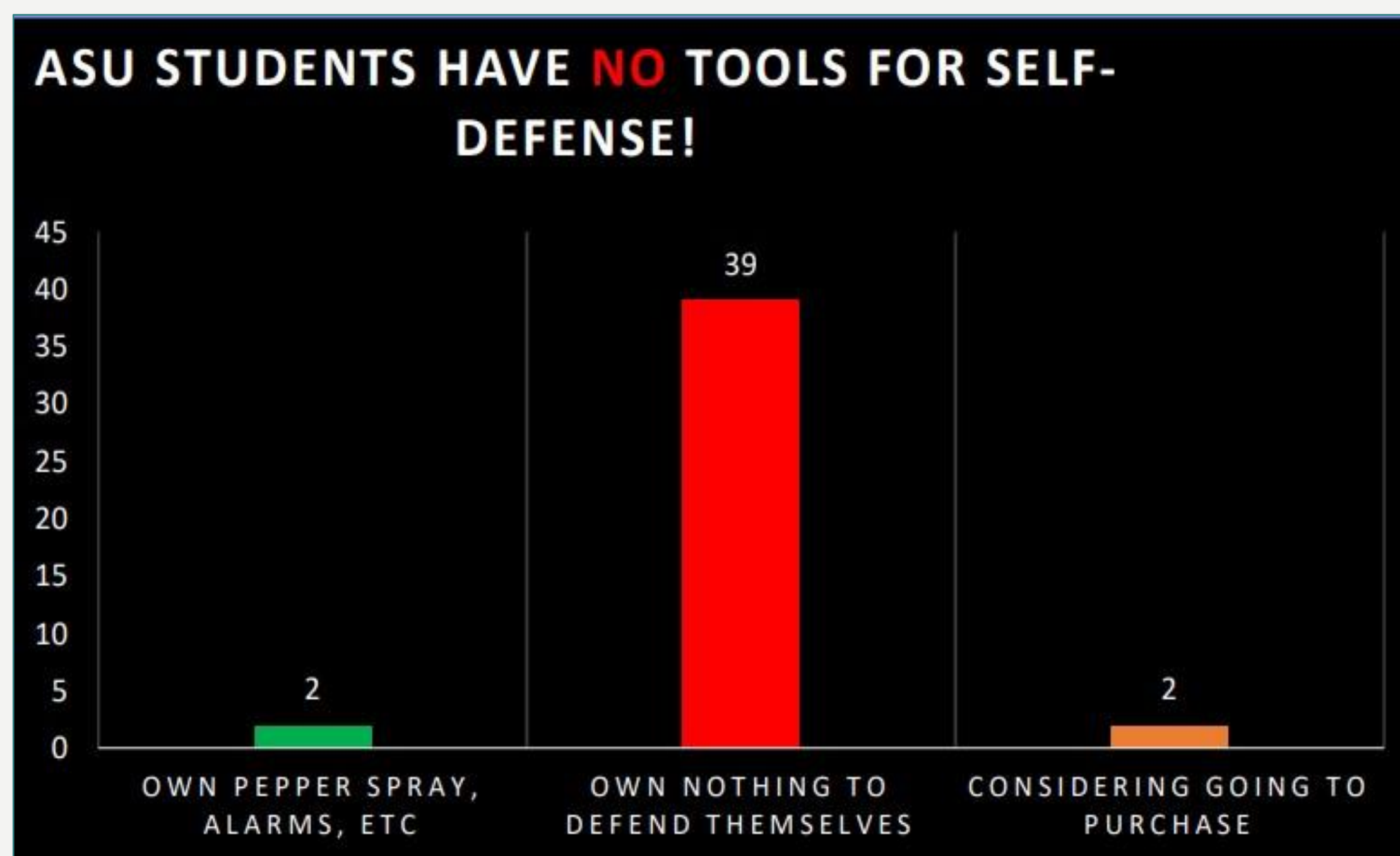
Self-Defense Keychain

13% of all students experience rape or sexual assault through physical force, violence, or incapacitation.

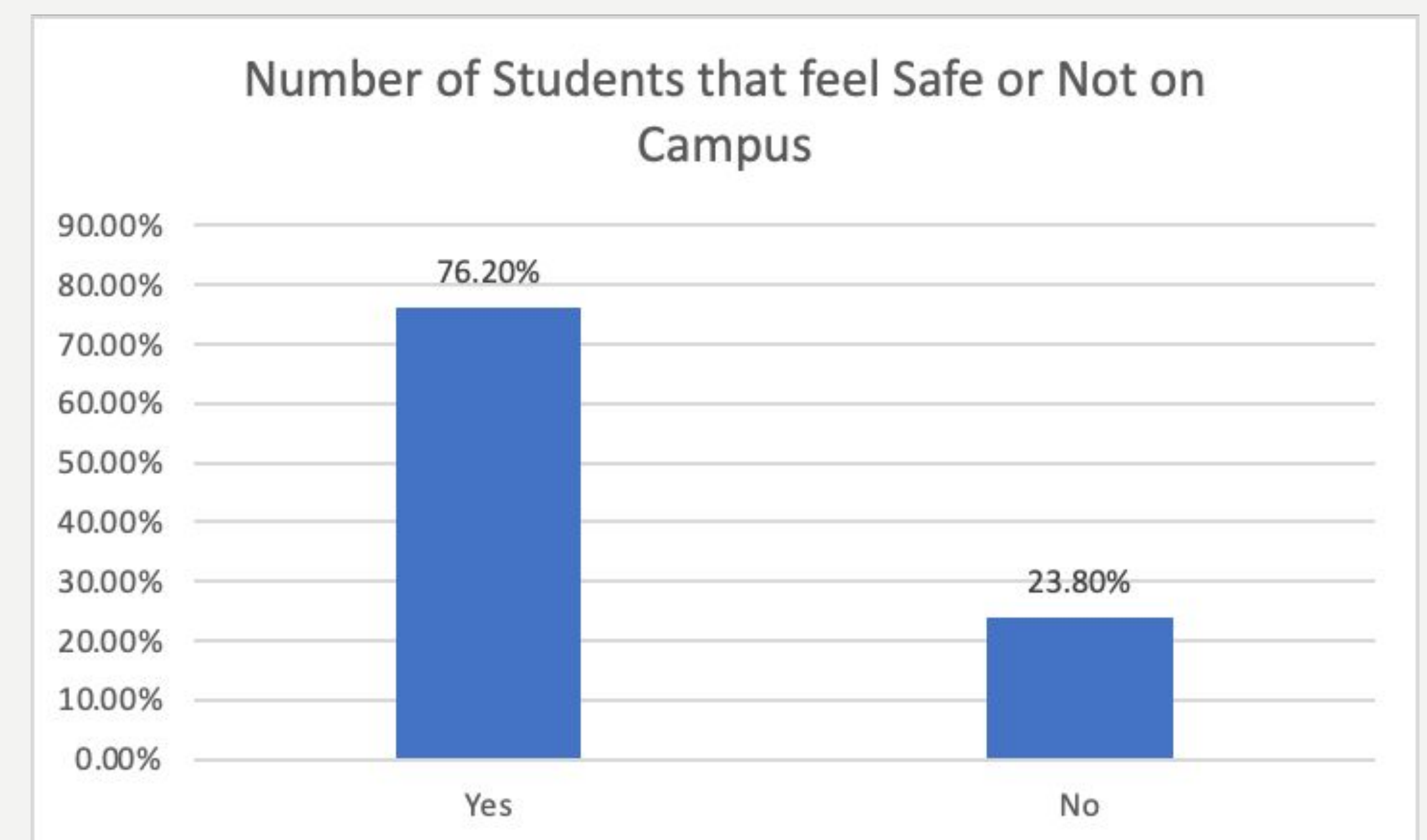
Some ways students have suggested to make campus feel safer is by getting security guards to walk through the perimeter of the dorm, finding ways to restrict access to on-campus dorms if not a student, adding more security cameras in and around campus, and more.



“Rape is the most common violent crime at ASU, UA and NAU. From 2017 to 2019, 68 incidents of rape were reported at ASU, according to the University’s Annual Security and Fire Safety Report.” - *The State Press*



Only about 37.2% of students think that the on campus dorms are safely secured. In order to ensure students safety, they should have access to self-defense keychains.



The graph above shows that about 91% of students do not carry any form of self defense with them.

This graph shows the percentages of students that do and do not feel safe on campus. With only about 24% answering ‘No’, around 76% of students do not feel safe on campus.
